

Safe Driving Standard

1.0 PURPOSE

This standard supports the Motor Vehicle Safety Policy and specifies requirements for safe driving while on company business.

2.0 DEFINITIONS

2.1 Defensive Driving

Defensive driving is a compilation of techniques used to reduce the risk of road hazards.

3.0 METHODS / PRACTICE

3.1 Identify Traffic Hazards

 Driving hazards shall be identified prior to departure through a hazard identification and risk assessment. This includes determining the weather forecast and road conditions.

3.2 Control Methods

- Before a trip, the driver shall:
 - o Perform a circle check.
- A driver shall not engage in any activities that distract from driving.
- A driver shall drive speeds appropriate to road conditions.
- A driver shall ensure that all occupants of the vehicle wear seat belts in compliance with Provincial driving regulations.
- If travel is deemed to be hazardous, the driver shall:
 - Consider postponing or cancelling the trip
 - Consider alternate routes to the destination.
 - o Consider other methods of participation, such as telephone or video conferencing.
 - Have a communication device.
 - o Equip the vehicle with a winter survival kit and suitable winter clothing.
 - Advise someone about departure time, route to be taken and expected time of arrival.
- Based on a hazard and risk assessment, appropriate driver training and / or awareness shall be provided to employees.
